

Student Code of Conduct 2023-2024

This Student Code of Conduct serves as a supplement to the Community Handbook in order to provide additional information regarding specific violations, interventions, and consequences. It works in tandem with the Community Handbook to provide clarity on policies related to student behavior.

During the first week of school, each grade level will review and discuss this Student Code of Conduct to ensure students and teachers have clear expectations for behavior and understand possible interventions and consequences. Students and families will then sign-off on their having read this Student Code of Conduct as well as the Community Handbook.

When a student is referred for a behavior listed below, the teacher/ administrator will take the following 4 steps:

- 1) Facilitate a private, reflective conversation with the student.
- 2) Make parent contact.
- 3) Determine appropriate interventions and consequences.
- 4) Communicate outcomes and action plans to involved parties.

It is important to note that the administrator may need to pull the student from class in order to discuss the issue. Only administrators have the authority to suspend.
